An on-line program for non-profits is now in Hawaii. This program allows NCC members and friends to purchase a Wormcycler direct-from-the-factory for a very reasonable price (\sim \$60). It makes a great holiday gift for the gardener in your family.

From November – January the NCC ohana and friends may go online and purchase a Wormcycler. Go to createcompost.com. Just answer the simple survey question, put in NCC's code which is "NCC8175" and click on the magnifying glass icon. Skip the question about the zip code and continue on.

Nichigobu News

The Rev. Armin and **Mrs. Evelyn Kroehler** will share their 49 years of experience as missionaries in Aizu, Japan at 9 a.m. **today** at the Nichigobu Worship Service in the former library, adjacent to the Fellowship lanai.

Rev. Kroehler, a graduate of Eden Theological Seminary, and ordained by the Montana United Church of Christ, and his wife Evelyn of 63 years, were commissioned missionaries to Aizu in 1950 by the United Church of Christ after two years of language study in Tokyo. From 1979 to 1999, Rev. Kroehler served as Director of the Aizu Christian Rural Life Center. The Kroehlers retired in 1999 in Honolulu.

Inspired by the steadfast faith of many Christians martyrs during the 17th century in Aizu Japan, they authored a book, <u>Kirishitan</u> <u>(Christian) in Aizu</u>. The pictorial book traces the history, artifacts, and locality of the Christians in Aizu (Northern Japan) during the feudal era when the warlords feared colonizations by Western powers. There appeared to be more Christians persecuted/martyred in Japan than in Rome relative to historical and scholastic accounts, burial sites, and monuments described in the book. Other publications by the Kroehlers include, <u>A Grain of Mustard Seed</u>.

Everyone is welcome to the Nichigobu worship.
