Shingles Shot

You may be aware that there has been a nationwide shortage of the newest shingles vaccine, with wait lists of many months to receive the doses. The folks from Long's who did the flu shot clinic for us last year have received a shipment of Shingrex. They are willing to hold the vaccines for two weeks and people can receive the shots at the Long's at 988 Halekauwila Street, phone 913-6996. You will need to provide your name, birth date, doctor's name (if you want a copy faxed to the MD), insurance information, and preferably a phone number (for copay communications). Long's will research whether or not your insurance will cover the vaccinations and what your copay would be. If twelve people sign up, they are willing to come back to our campus to administer the vaccine here.

For those unfamiliar with the vaccine, it is recommended for the protection of shingles in adults 50 years and older. It is a two shot series; the second shot is administered 2-6 months after the first shot. It came out in early 2018 and has a much higher efficacy rate (>90%) than the old Zostavax shot that some of you may have had previously. Current recommendations are to get Shingrix even if an individual may have had Zostavax previously. Shingles is a very painful condition. This vaccination has been in very short supply and we are fortunate to have this opportunity to get immunized. Please let **Judy Keith** know if you are interested in receiving this immunization on campus. But if twelve people are not interested, you still have the opportunity to get the shots at Long's.
