This year, Ash Wednesday is February 26, 2020. To prepare for Ash Wednesday, Nu'uanu Congregational Church has the tradition of burning the palms from the previous Palm Sunday, on the Sunday

before Ash Wednesday. We will burn the 2019 palms after worship on **Sunday, February 23, 2020**. Reminder: Bring your palm crosses to place in the fire. If you cannot remember where you left your palm cross, don't worry. We will have a cross for you to place in the fire.

- 1. Clean small plastic gallon size or smaller garden pots, or

- 3. Nearly new/gently used kitchen and household items. <u>No clothing will be accepted.</u>
- 4. Tillandsia type small air plants which we can attach to driftwood or put in small containers let Velma know.
- 5. Potted Plants to be delivered the week of April 15-17, **not before**, unless you have arranged it with Velma).
- 6. Water plants and grasses to be delivered the week of April 15-17, **not before**, unless you have arranged it with Velma).
- 7. Red wiggler worms.
- 8. Clean gently used shopping bags for our customers.

Worship Practices for Flu Season

With the flu season in full swing, churches here and across the nation are modifying worship practices to guard against spreading the disease. Here are some tips to follow:

- 1. If you are well, do not fear germs more than you love Jesus, unless your immune system is seriously compromised.
- 2. Stay home, if you are sick with something you can easily spread to others. Take care of yourself, and get well. Then come to worship and thank God for helping you recover.
- 3. Common sense says do not cough or sneeze on others if you do come to church. Cover your mouth with a tissue and wash your hands. Airborne particles (from coughing and sneezing) and skin to skin contact are by far the most likely means to transmit flu and other infectious agents.
- 4. Before going to receive communion, use the hand sanitizer on the table near the front door.
- 5. Be not afraid! When we gather for worship, we are there to offer ourselves in praise, thanksgiving, and joy to our God, in songs, prayers, dance, art, music, drama, and with water, Scripture, bread and wine. The perfect love of God who meets us here casts out all fear.

Stewardship Update

As of January 1, we received a total of 69 pledges totaling \$218,966. This is a significant decrease from 2019, wherein we had 85 pledges totaling \$237,186, a decrease of 17 pledges and \$18,220. A further breakdown of the figures show:

- · Two of those were due to death
- · 26 of the pledging units increased their pledges
- 6 of the pledging units decreased their pledge amounts.

We are grateful to those who have committed to continuing our ministry at NCC. If you have not yet submitted your pledge for 2020, it's not too late. Please ask an usher for a pledge card or stop by the church office for one.
