

Now What?

I recently had the pleasure of attending the annual Kamehameha Song Contest at the Blaisdell Arena. It was the first time I had ever been, the first time I knew someone who was attending school there. Having watched the contest for many years on television (Friday evening *and* Sunday afternoon) I had been looking forward to this since last summer when a young friend started at Kamehameha Schools as a junior.

I was <u>not</u> disappointed. The kids processed in by class. All wore white—white *muumuu* for the young women, white shirts, and slacks for the young men—with "a shocking bloom of color" of flower *lei* around their necks. Each wore their class color.

I was also not disappointed by the crowd: the Blaisdell arena looked like it was filled to capacity with family and friends. We greeted the young people, and each of their song offerings, with thunderous applause and enthusiasm. I was seated with my friend's grandmother and godmother. Throughout the evening the old building rang with the sound of young voices singing Hawaiian *mele*.

Afterward, pandemonium, as family and friends met the singer they had come to support on the huge lanai outside of the arena. Those without a good pre-agreed upon place to meet were doomed to wander through the lanai looking for the right *lei* color amid the hundreds of similarly dressed young people. The girls *all* seemed to have long, dark hair, in addition to identical white *muumuu*.

I mention this event because I am still basking in the pleasure of having been able to attend the contest for the very first time. I am still savoring the experience of all of those young, strong voices raised in song; even more astonished at the hours of dedicated rehearsal of melody, and the attention to articulation and precise delivery of the Hawaiian language.

For the seniors who won every trophy that evening, it must have been "a dream come true," and the best way in the world to finish their academic life at Kamehameha Schools. They got to do what we are told is rarely possible: *they got their cake and they get to eat it, too!*

As for the other classes, I dare say they were disappointed—but not too much. There is still next year.

I thought about all of this as I thought about our worship *after* Easter. We, too, have been moving toward a goal, and a prize of sorts. During Lent, we rehearsed our faith—which is to say we prepared and learned as we sang the psalms with a different song leader every Sunday. We also weathered the drama and the sorrow of Passion Sunday as we recalled Jesus' arrest, the betrayal, the brutality, and the darkness that covered the earth when he died on the cross.

But then there was Easter.

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Now What?

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By the time you read this, we have been together as the organ has soared and thundered the great news that Christ Is Risen! By now we will have listened to the trumpets' joyful music proclaiming the bright new light that has returned to the world. It has returned to you and me. Alleluias and Hosannas filled our hymns and our throats as we declared our thankfulness and faith in God's love that will not let us go.

We have experienced all that excitement...but...now what? What do we do? What do we do with what we have learned? After we declare, *He Is Risen!*—what else are we supposed to say? What do we do with the feelings that have been aroused by the hope and gladness of Christ's empty tomb?

In the Gospel of Luke, we are told that once he had looked into the empty tomb, Peter went away "amazed," but also unsure of what was going to come next. Luke says he went home. However, when the Risen Christ came back to the disciples, he found them all in the upper room. They had not failed to spread the news and it was their wonder and anxious hope that gathered them together.

Being together, they were able to receive Christ *even in the face of all that had been*.

Friends, in the face of all the world is, and is not, we may not know what to do next. We may feel "at lose ends" after the "special" day has passed. That is okay. What we can (and will) do next is perhaps the most mundane, and the most subversive, and important, and hopeful act we can accomplish: we can gather and remember. We can gather and "tell the story." We can gather and in the face of all the world is, and is not, we can proclaim the love of God that will not die, but will always break out of the tombs that empire and hatred attempt to bury it in. We can gather to sing and pray and share God's faith, hope, and love with each other proclaiming to the world: *Christ Is Risen! He Is Risen Indeed!*

- 11. Spread on bread in grilled cheese sandwiches.
- 12. Add to Stuffing for turkey.
