What Death Taught Me About Life

From Death to Life

This summer will be NCC's sixth year leading Vacation Bible School at Lana'i Union Church. It'll be the first summer without James Anton. James was a young boy from Lana'i who had attended our VBS for the past five years. He was there every summer... one of the many kids we looked forward to seeing when we would return.

Last August, James had a sudden, unexpected, and unexplainable seizure, was flown to Oahu, and hospitalized in the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at Kapiolani Hospital. James was in a coma and remained in the hospital for two months. Sarah and I would visit him on Wednesday afternoons each week.

James died on Wednesday, October 14, 2015. We got the call that his parents had decided to remove the life support because there had been no brain activity. As we were told that family members were gathering to say their good-byes, my heart sank as I thought about his family and friends whom even I had come to know. I was heartbroken as I considered saying my final good bye to James.

As I look back to that time in the Fall, I wonder if our visits helped James to let go knowing that he will always be loved and connected through Christ. Perhaps it did. One thing I am sure of is that I know our visits helped us to let him go. When I think further back to even before James was in the hospital, I think of how the Lana'i Mission Trips played a part in this experience. When I look back, I can see where God was working in all the little connections through the relations we formed with the people of Lana'i Union Church over the years. It almost seems as if God was preparing us... or is it because God is *always* preparing us for when death parts us from our loved ones? Maybe preparation for the inevitable death is what life is all about.

There are a few things I learned from journeying with James in his final days:

- 1. James taught me that in our helplessness, we can trust God. James' dad told us one day to keep praying because prayer is the best medicine. While I was praying, I realized that prayer is medicine for us, also. Praying invites God into our hearts so we can see how God is still working and trust that God is even in the suffering, when we weep and mourn and pray together.
- James taught me how to love. It may be rather cliché to say that we should <u>love</u> someone like we're going to lose them,

but since tomorrow is not guaranteed, we are to love intensely in every moment we do have. We have an unknown number of days, a lifetime, to love and be loved.

3. James helped me to see that <u>death is not</u> the <u>final answer</u>. There *is* life after death—for James, and for the people who are still grieving his loss. He lives in our hearts and memories. When we live every present moment with peace, with passion, with love, we live a life that's worth celebrating and remembering even after we're gone, a life that brings life to the people around us, a life that has life after death, and really has no end.

From birth to death, we are housed in these bodies that enable us to interact with one another and the world around us. We are human beings, living and breathing so that we may be together. And maybe that's what the journey of life is. We are alive to accompany one another in love. Whether a lifetime lasts 10 minutes, 10 years, or 10 decades, a lifetime of love leaves its effects on everyone it touches. It is for love and through love that we are given life. And the Easter story is that it is through the love of Christ and his death we are given life. Christ is risen! Christ is risen, indeed!

Sabbatical Leave

At its meeting on September 16, 2014, the Church Council approved a 3-month sabbatical for **Pastor Mary** to be taken between May 31 and November 30, 2015. However, because

Pastor Mary was granted a leave of absence from October 1, 2014 to January 24, 2015, the Church Council, together with Pastor Mary, has revised the plans for her sabbatical leave. Rather than take a 3-month sabbatical leave in the fall of 2015, Pastor Mary will take three one-month sabbatical leaves.

The first month of this sabbatical leave was in October 2015. The second month of this sabbatical leave will take place in April 2016. Pastor Mary will combine one week of study leave and one week of vacation along with one month of sabbatical leave. For her study leave, she will attend the annual conference of the Korean American Presbyterian Clergywomen in Princeton; and during her sabbatical, she will spend time in Korea to study the intersection of spirituality in Buddhism, Confucianism, Taoism, and Christianity.



During this leave from **April 4 to May 16**, the **Rev. Kyle Lovett** will preach and will be on-call for pastoral emergencies. She

Town HallMeeting Summary

The Town Hall concept of congregational gathering was adopted as part of the overall "Plan for Moving Forward as a United Church" at a special congregational meeting in November 2015. This is part of the effort to provide different opportunities to communicate with the congregation as well as to provide congregants and friends an opportunity to give and receive feedback, Facilitator Elizabeth Kent and Mr. Arthur Goto have assisted and collaborated with the summary below as part of this process of informing the congregation of this meeting. It is hoped that with these efforts in this process that more will feel ready to attend one of these meetings to provide their opinions and feel that they have been heard.

Moderator Laurie Hamano

Town Hall Meeting Summary Nuuanu Congregational Church Sunday, March 6, 2016, Noon - 1:40 p.m.

The meeting opened with a prayer by Pastor Mary. Approximately 20 people attended the Town Hall meeting.

The first subject attendees discussed was **communication**. A concern was raised regarding planning for membership meetings and a suggestion made that if more input was solicited and there was more communication in advance, then meetings would run more effectively. Moderator Laurie Hamano stated that the omission of the topic "New Business" from the agenda of the annual meeting was an oversight, and that they would do better next time. She noted that her process now would be to request input prior to a membership meeting.

Another item of discussion was the best way to share information. E-News, which has links, is effective for those who have computers but is not effective for those who do not use computers and some people have trouble with attachments. It was pointed out that the Church admin office does not mail hard copies of the e-news. This issue was left open. There was some discussion about where the gap, if any, was. It was noted that in the past, the moderator shared highlights each month and highlights were included in The Caller. Moderator Laurie Hamano will consider this as she starts her term.

The next subject attendees discussed was **collaboration**. It was commented that everyone wants to be heard, to have their ideas solicited, and have their concerns taken under consideration. Town meetings provide a venue for this. Moderator Hamano noted that her intention for future annual meetings is to a) have a meeting such as the town hall to discuss the agenda and b) place items on the agenda beforehand and then to send out the meeting notice to the membership once we figure out the agenda.

There was general discussion about the best ways to reach out and the need for people to inform themselves and stay involved (not a one-way street, but at the same time provide opportunities to be heard and be informed at the membership meeting). The facilitator thought that there seemed to be general agreement among attendees that major work could be accomplished in smaller venues, and that attendees thought the two-hour annual meeting would be more effective if a lot of preparation work is done prior to the meeting. There was some comment that it is easier to talk in small groups than in large groups.

The next subject attendees discussed was the basis of member's vote as to Part I of the proposed mediation agreement. (During the discussion the term "Part A" was used in lieu of

the label "Part I." The term "Part I" is the correct term and is used by the Facilitator and Editors.) This discussion was energetic and dynamic, and at times, emotional. Many people participated, both in speaking and in sharing their thoughts in writing. Attendees shared their reasons for voting the way they did. Responses included (in no particular order) NCC is no longer a Japanese Church and no longer has a Japanese speaking membership; the majority of the congregation does not read, speak, or understand Japanese; question the number of people who would be served; everyone understands English; it would be inconvenient and boring to have two languages in one service; a joint service would take too much time; didn't want a joint service; the main function or purpose of a church is to worship, Jesus' Great Commission calls upon us to make disciples of all nations, there is a desire for worship in Japanese in our community, and that has been a mission of the NCC from its inception; prefer a worship service for all; wanted to give it a try; the amount of money that Part I would cost does not justify good stewardship of the congregation's contributions; and if there is a joint service large portions of it would not be understandable and would not be relevant.

The group then talked about the consequences of the vote. It was pointed out that the Diaconate recently created a heritage subcommittee and the provisions in the Mediation Plan to honor history and heritage passed. Another attendee pointed out that time could be spent addressing the commission to spread God's word in different ways. One view expressed was that the rejection of Part I meant that there was to be no worship services in the Japanese language at the NCC. Another attendee said that the consequence of failing to adopt that

portion brings the status of Japanese language worship services back to what it was before the mediation which was a disagreement as to the meaning of the "Ann Ito motion" passed at the 2014 annual meeting. Another attendee said that it seemed a part-time Japanese speaking minister would satisfy those who want Japanese speaking ministry. A suggestion was made to have some sort of worship after the joint service. Others discussed ways to include everyone who attends NCC.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Moderator Laurie Hamano thanked everyone for attending and participating. Pastor Mary closed the session with a prayer.

Next Town Hall Meeting May 22, 2016 at 10:30 a.m. in the choir room.


