Of course, there is always more that you can do, but we trust that the Spirit will reveal to you new opportunities for faithful witness.

Update from the Pastoral Search Committee

Greetings from your Pastoral Search Committee! For anyone who missed the January 27, 2019 service and annual meeting, here's a brief recap of my verbal report.

As you may recall, the Search Committee, comprised of Donald Ikeda, Josie Ing, Ann Ito, Cheryl Chock, Shirley Miyamoto, Carol Hamada and myself, was commissioned on October 1, 2017.* Since then, we have made steady progress, including drafting and finalizing NCC's local church profile (essentially, a comprehensive statement of our church in all its various aspects, such as membership, activities and participation, finances, future direction and vision, and so on), and establishing a nice working relationship with the folks at Hawai'i Conference UCC.

We began receiving minister profiles from around May 2018 and, to date, we have reviewed about thirty candidate profiles. The committee meets regularly, at least twice a month, and we diligently review and discuss pastor profiles at our meetings. Unfortunately, to date, we have yet to identify a leading candidate or candidates.

Notwithstanding the challenges, the Search Committee is committed to staying the course. We continue to work diligently, and we remain hopeful that God will bless our efforts, and that the Holy Spirit will guide us in this search process. We are grateful for the congregation's support, and we humbly ask for your continued support and prayers.

*The Pastoral Search Committee is responsible for all aspects leading to the identification and nomination of a pastor for our church, including, for example, drafting our local church profile, reviewing pastor candidate profiles, interviewing candidates, and negotiating the terms of a proposed call agreement. The membership, however, makes the final decision on any candidate to be called as our pastor.

Membership

When our church was started back in 1885, I wonder if our founding members ever thought that NCC would still be here 134 years later? After all, they left their homes, families, friends and life as they knew it for what was supposed to be a 3-year job. As they started new lives in Hawai'i, they also converted to Christianity, which meant giving up the religion they grew up with and was so closely tied to their identity.

What did it mean to be a member back then? Was it all about sacrifice? There must've been some good things, including the promise of eternal life and knowing that God loves them unconditionally, that they would stick it out. I imagine they were probably alienated and looked down upon by other Japanese who remained Buddhist, so perhaps the church provided a place where they could not only gather to worship, but to support each other through crisis, celebrate their joys, and help their community. Maybe they used the "tanomoshi" system of mutual assistance, where they collected money from all the members and gave the total to a single member to pay off debts or fund a wedding or funeral. And perhaps that's how they figured they could fund the church, so more people could be helped.

And what does it mean to be a member today? The church by-laws spells out our "duties," but what does that mean to you?

(Excerpts from the NCC By-Laws, Article V -Membership)

Section 4 - Duties - "Members are expected to be faithful to all duties essential to Christian life: to attend regularly the services of the Church; to pledge and give systematically for its support and its benevolences; to participate and share in its organized work; to seek diligently the spiritual welfare of their fellow members

Section 5 - Rights - "All members may expect ministration of the Church and shall have the right to participate in all Church activities, except, however, that only regular, active members shall have the right to hold any elective office in the Church and the right to vote on any and all questions concerning the affairs of the Church, unless otherwise specifically provided by law, the Charter of Incorporation or these By-Laws.

Section 6 - Categories - (A) Active - "An active member is one who diligently and faithfully, to the best of his or her ability, endeavors to carry out his or duties as a member of the Church "


