

Today, many would call her a bag lady. Anyway, she would dress in a dowdy, worn dress and pushed around a grocery cart throughout the city. She was a familiar face, but no one really paid any attention to this harmless, poor woman. Eventually, she died and she left all her worldly belongings to the Salvation Army, because, as she said, they treated her with dignity and respect, as well as feeding her. To everyone's surprise, her "worldly belongings" amounted to over \$200, 000! That was a lot of money back then.

Selected thoughts in Pastor Jeannie's own words [From her personal statement]

I am curious about people and like to listen deeply to people of all ages as they share stories about who they are. I am interested in learning about their gifts and how God is calling them to use them.

The vitality and well-being of the individual and the community/congregation depends on the quality and character of the relationships in which they are in. Therefore, foundational to ministry, and to life, is the cultivation and nurture of one's relationship with God.

Our example is always Christ, and the way in which he did not hold back, but instead fully lived his life with us, walking the same roads we walk—the road of joyful friendships, of wedding

feasts, of long journeys on hot, thirsty days when it was good to sit and rest, also of disappointments, hunger, rest, prayer and worship.

[From sermon, "Out of Egypt," based upon Exodus 16:2-15, when the bickering and complaining Israelites were wandering through the wilderness, and God provided them with quail and manna.]

The point of the story is this: God knows we are hungry, and God provides for our needs. We might want something spicier, something richer, something comforting, something different, but God is more concerned about giving us what we need so that we can keep moving toward the larger objective that God has for us. Friends, Egypt is behind us. Ahead of us is a future where God is already striding and summoning us forward to join God. Our Good News is that God is feeding us and making us strong so that we can do just that. The same will be true for us [as it was for the Israelites] if we stay faithful and keep following God and allowing ourselves to be fed on the food that Egypt never knew, the bread and meat of God's future for us

On February 16, we are privileged to have **The Rev. Dr. David Popham**, Conference Minister for the Hawai'i Conference UCC preaching at NCC. Rev. 
