

Always Forward!

Last Monday, September 21, we had a morning of misty rain here in Kaimuki. For those of you who don't know where I live, I am about a mile up the mountain from Waialae Avenue, off 16th. The view from the front of the apartment overlooks much of the Kaimuki, Diamond Head, and part of Waikiki.

Last week's rainy morning, on the first day of fall, gave me some hope that cooler weather was setting in. Well, I can dream, can't I? I had hoped that the weather, at least, would co-operate and bring cooler, more refreshing days. I

am, at times, impatient with the weather, the virus, with government officials, with the management of this crisis, with...the list is long. Patience is not easy, especially when so many people are suffering in so many ways—physically, spiritually, emotionally, economically.

There are so many ways in which we have had to be patient. We are keeping a safe distance from friends and even family. We wash our hands constantly and carry hand sanitizer. We have up-ended our lives and we worry. We worry about the stranger next to us in the checkout line who just sneezed—is she safely six feet away, we wonder. The masks are hot and annoying—but we are committed to wearing them.

This has been going on for more than six months, now.

I know that many of us, including me, were hoping things would be different by now. Unfortunately, we are still not worshipping in person. After one month back in our Sanctuary, this past summer's decision to go back to exclusively online worship proved to be a sound one.

It was wonderful to be able to greet many of you in person (from a safe distance) but it was unfortunate and frightening when the numbers went so high. Let us continue to keep in our prayers the many people who have lost loved ones, and those who are nursing others back to health and wholeness.

At this point, the daily infection numbers have gone down, thank goodness, but they have not declined to a point that our church leadership feels confident about resuming in-person worship but please do take heart because circumstances and conditions continue to evolve, and the NCC leadership team is keeping a close watch over it all. We are also keeping in close contact with each other and discuss the situation almost daily.

Neighbors in Need Offering

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry. Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities. We will be collecting this offering starting October 4, 2020. One afternoon, Asa's car wouldn't start, so as she innocently sat outside Ewa Town Square eating her saimin while waiting for Bryan to pick her up, she was brutally attacked and murdered. From that moment forward, the lives of Bryan, Katie, and Tori turned upside down.

In his newly published book, <u>Faith</u>, <u>Hanging By a Thread</u>, Bryan shares his reflections in three parts: The Tragedy and A Three-Legged Table, Forgiveness and Faith, and Restoration and Hope. The book is filled with emotion, anecdotes, and even some humor! Mostly, it's about their faith in God's love that got this family through the many struggles and challenges.


