

In-Person Worship

We are so excited to restart in-person on June 6, 2021! The Diaconate and the Board of Trustees have created a protocol to reduce the risk in the transmission of COVID-19 while we worship at Nu'uanu Congregational Church.

Prior to Entering into the Sanctuary

- Put on your face mask prior to leaving your car.
- Your temperature will be checked with a non-contact thermometer before you enter the sanctuary. If you have a fever, you will be asked to return to your home.
- Worship bulletins will be distributed by an usher.

During Worship

- Wear your face mask all the time.
- Keep six feet or more social distancing from non-family/household members.
- No red attendance books.
- Unfortunately, no singing during worship and no choir...for now.
- Offering plates will be placed at the sanctuary entrance. You may place your

- offering envelope in the offering plate as you enter or exit the sanctuary.
- •Joys and Concerns Someone will wipe the microphone prior to the next person speaking.
- •Passing of the Peace You can Pass the Peace by waving, acknowledging each other from where you are seated.
- •No receiving line.
- •If you use the restrooms during worship, wash your hands properly and use a paper towel to shut the water off

After Worship

- •Orderly exit of sanctuary led by ushers to keep the minimum of six feet social distancing.
- •Sorry, no refreshments.
- •Disinfect the restrooms for the next group to use.

We will modify our procedures as recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Hawai'i Department of Health are updated. The Council and the Boards thanks you for your patience, your flexibility, and your desire to worship inperson.

On May 18, 2021 the results of the Strategic Plan vote came in:

91 votes approved the plan out of 94 received ballots.

At its May 18, 2021, meeting, the NCC Council recommended that a Transition Team be formed and with Susan Iha as its chair. Susan will be asking for your help to formulate the way forward. And we need everyone's help to do that.

From this point forward, we will be providing updates to you about the Transition Team's process through The Caller. We will also be asking for your help and most of all, your prayers for God's continued guidance to help us create a path toward building our future.

We also have informed the Hawai'i Conference Foundation (HCF) that the NCC membership overwhelmingly approved having the Conference and Foundation consider moving their offices to NCC's campus. There are so many more decisions to be made before this can happen, but we wanted to make sure the HCF knew how supportive NCC was toward their relocation to our campus. We pray that we can work out the many necessary decisions that are needed so that we can partner successfully with them.


