# All Saints Day 2021: Remembering Our Loved Ones Lost to COVID-19

On Monday, November 1st, All Saints Day, Central Union Church (CUC) will host an all-day memorial event to remember those people in our Hawaii community who have died of COVID-19.

A chair for each person will be placed on the lawn in front of CUC which is located at 1660 South Beretania Street.

Throughout the day, pastors from our UCC churches will take shifts to offer a ministry of presence. All people from every faith tradition are invited to stop and pay their respects. At noon, we will begin tolling the bell for each person who has died since the pandemic began.

Says the Rev. Brandon Duran of CUC: "we will give thanks for those who died, and hope this gesture will provide a space for loved ones to remember and grieve."

The event will be open to the public starting at 8:00 AM until 6:00PM, November 1st.

So, too, autumn arrives with its requirements. As the days lengthen we are invited, not to stop, but to allow our senses to come to rest in the deep rich jewel tones of falling leaves and golden gloamings. Now, we may take the time to breathe in the cooling air and permit ourselves our own kind of falling—into a quieter, less traveled interval, and a space wherein we may take the time to reflect and remember.

Rev. Richardson wrote the poem I have shared as she contemplated a short passage from the Gospel of Mark. The waning fires of summer reminded her of: "For everyone will be salted with fire." [Mark 9:49], and of ceramic artists and how they "know what happens when salt is added to the fire. Thrown into the kiln, this elemental essence alters the surface of the pot in a fashion that cannot be entirely predicted or controlled. The potter has to trust that when the salt is given to the fire, it will do its work; that, blessed by the intention and focus the potter brings, the salt will make a way for the wild beauty that will come."

My friends, the whole of our lives is like that moment in a potter's life, and during this past couple of year this has been especially true. We have committed our future, as a church, to the blessing of service and faithfulness the particulars of which is still unfolding. Yet, we may be confident that the road ahead of us will not be random wandering in the wilderness. Rather, we are invited to continue on with the same Spirit that has been with Nu'uanu Congregational Church from the beginning. We are invited to a "wild beauty" that is still ahead of us. My prayer for all of us is that with the coming on of autumn we may take this time to remember all of the souls who have traveled with us and give thanks for their lives, even as we contemplate the next phase of our journey blessed by God, centered in Christ, and led by the Spirit.

## State to Distribute 1 Million Free At-home COVID Tests on Oahu

With the help of a Federal pilot program, the state health department will be distributing 1 million free, at home COVID Test to eligible zip codes.

To order a test kit, go to <u>COVIDTestHonolulu.org</u>. They're available through Oct. 18 while supplies last.

Residents in the following zip codes are available to get the tests:

Officials said 125,000 Oahu residents in eligible zip codes will get eight rapid antigen tests in order to test twice a week for four weeks. Ideal candidates include those who are unvaccinated or have a high risk of COVID exposure.

Participants in the program will get rapid antigen tests that require a quick swab inside each nostril. Results are ready in about 10 minutes.

Those who test positive on self-administered tests should follow <u>home isolation guidelines</u> and contact their healthcare provider to seek follow-up testing.


