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All Saints Sunday 2021: Looking Back With Love, Gratitude, and Hope

Recently, a visiting friend was wondering what to take as a special thank you treat for the office staff she had been working with during the week. I suggested one of my favorite treats: *dim sum!* So, off we went to one of the *dim sum* places I know: The Island Manapua Factory, in Manoa Marketplace.

While she was in the shop directing the counter man as he packed-up pork hash, half moons, charsiu manapua, and the like, I went back out to the car and marveled at the fact that the place was still open, <u>and</u> that there was still a crack seed shop just a few doors down.

I could not stop myself from feelings of nostalgia as I remembered how, when I was growing up, there were crack seed shops on almost every corner. Mostly they were little mom-and-pop places, and if there was a little extra room in the shop, there would also have been a cold drink cooler with "Coke-a-Cola" logos all over it. However, when you slid the top open and reached down into the icy water, you were just as likely to fish-out a glass bottle of Pepsi or root beer, as you were a Coke.

Mostly, I try not to wander down memory lane too often, nor for too long. I tell myself that such excursions are, at best, time-eaters, and at worst, a source of loneliness, even a character flaw and attempt to hide from the new things that have muscled their way into my life that I do not feel ready to deal with or face.

Thus, indulging in nostalgia has been a secret and guilty pleasure, a weakness to be shunned and embarrassed about, rather than a strength to be proud of. Indeed, nostalgia was once considered a mental ailment in the 17th and 18th centuries. A common view has been that nostalgia keeps people stuck in the past, unable to live in the present or plan for the future.

However, new research has begun to tell a different story. Andrew Abeyta, PhD, and an assistant professor of psychology at Rutgers University Camden, describes nostalgia as an emotional experience that involves reminiscing about something about your past you find truly special or meaningful. In an article on nostalgia published in *ScienceDirect, Abeyta* says recalling idealized memories from past happy times is associated with feelings of warmth, yearning, longing, desire, and wistful affection. "We find that reflecting on nostalgic memories enriches people's lives in several way," he says.

"Images, sounds, smells, and memories from earlier chapters in our lives — particularly positive or meaningful ones from our youth — can provoke potent feelings that unlock underlying functional benefits, including positive self-esteem and self-understanding, social connectedness, optimism for the future, increased empathy, and psychological growth. Revisiting meaningful memories can give one hope that they can create new meaningful memories in the future."

In Search of Rev. Masaichi's Wartime Banner

We need your help locating an old cloth banner—or any information related to the banner -which was once stored for many years, dating back to the 1970s, at Nuuanu Congregational Church but appears to be missing. The banner was created by Rev. Masaichi Goto and displayed at NCC's men's dormitory during World War II when the church was located at Kukui Street and Nuuanu Avenue. The banner lists the names of dormitory residents who volunteered to serve our country when the war began. Also listed are names of the young men, highlighted with a blue star, who were killed in action. One person recalls the banner having a colored border along its edges and measuring approximately 3.5 ft. wide x 5 ft. long. We are also interested in finding the names of anyone who lived in the dormitory during those wartime years.

Randy Obata, a member of the Kensaku and Tsuru Obata Endowment Committee, is seeking the banner for inclusion in the Endowment's current video and oral history project about NCC. 
