Summer Sabbath

It has been a long-time coming, but summer travel has finally been deemed safe to do again, so long as one adheres to CDC protocols, and so a lot of people have been on the road. Indeed, at this point in the season, most of us have already heard/shared numerous stories about how family and friends are choosing to spend these long, warm days.

Relatives—children and grandchildren, sisters, brothers—have made the sojourn back to the "old homestead," or they have opened their homes and put aside other activities to gather for family reunions. Then, of course, there are the weddings... the brides are always beautiful, but I often pity the groom

whose outfit is seldom suited to the heat.

Each season of the year brings its own activities, its rituals and routines, but summer is famous for the breaking of routine for the sake of rest and/or recreation. It's a time for family, and a vacation adventure in a foreign place…like Disneyland.

Then, there are *staycations*—the vacation that is spent at home. The pandemic did not count as a staycation. However, many people are still finding it more comfortable to spend their summer break in their own backyard.

All of this breaking-from-routine is not only a good thing, believe-it-or-not, it can even be a <u>blessed</u> thing. We call it "vacation," or "reunion," or simply "visiting" or "resting," but what all of these things have in common is a deliberate and concerted effort to step away from what we know and do the rest of the year.

It is recognizing that no matter how rewarding we find our regular lives, vacations are a commitment to giving oneself a time for rest and rejuvenation from the routine stress and obligations "regular life" quite naturally includes.

In fact, if we will let it, a summer break can be a commitment to break the conceit we may have for one routine and *allow God to remake the rhythm of our lives*.

Is it as wonder-filled to you as it is to me, that God thought about this need we would have eons ago and made it a part of the first story we are told about God and humankind? Way back, in the Garden of Eden, after all had been made and pronounced "good," God stepped back from God's labors and rested. Much later, as the Hebrew people were led from slavery to freedom, once again, God intervened in their determined trek toward the Promised Land and decreed that even this critical journey was to be put aside one day of the week to rest.

For many years in our country's history, we followed this custom. In fact, we put laws in place prohibiting business or commerce on Sunday—blue laws (thanks to the Puritans—our ancestors in the faith). There are, to this day, still some states with blue laws on the books. They are few, but they still exist.

The thing about Sabbath that should be important for Christians, is that God recognized, ordained, and blessed our work—not by giving us *more* work but—by also giving us time to rest and give thanks for the good work God has done through us. God, through example and Scripture, tells us that rest is just as important as labor, and that even those times of rest are filled with God's presence and blessing; that time away from routine—a break in our daily lives—is yet another opportunity to experience the wonder of God's love and care of us.

I hope all of us are taking a little time this summer to rest and enjoy family and friends, or just some "down time." I, too, will be taking some time off in August to *finally* have hip replacement surgery and will be on medical leave from August 27 through September 17. I pray all of us will have the blessing of rest and the rejuvenation it brings.

Give Aloha will be Back




