

The Best Medicine

Most of us remember a regular feature in *Reader's Digest* called, *Laughter is the Best Medicine*. I do not know if the magazine still has this monthly feature. I do not know if the magazine even still exists. However, I do believe in the premise. I believe that laughter is good medicine, and that we should allow ourselves a good healthy dose of it as often as possible.

I was reminded of this as I was reading a devotional sent out a few years ago by the UCC's *Still Speaking Writers' Group*. One of the writers, Rev. John Edgerton of Old South Church in Boston, titled his article, *Sarah Laughed, So Can You*.

Rev. Edgerton recalls how Sarah laughed when she overheard an angel say something that seemed too absurd to even contemplate. The angel said that she, Sarah, was going to conceive and bear a child [Genesis 18:10-12]. Sarah laughed because, as the Bible delicately puts it: she was so old that "it had ceased to be with Sarah after the manner of women." [v.11]

Sarah's laughter was an expression of surprise—after so many years of trying, hoping, and praying—how could this be true, <u>now</u>?!

Aside from this very natural response, there is another part of Sarah's laughter that occurs to me which was Sarah and Abraham's years of trying, hoping, and praying only to face month-after-month, and then year-after-year of disappointment.

It is difficult to think of the decades that had come and gone in their life together without the happy sounds of children in their tent. The silence of their meals together must have been a constant source of sorrow—the same start and end of every day, all devoid of the children they had so wanted.

For Sarah, it would also have been embarrassing and a source of shame as people often thought such things to be God's judgement on the woman.

Despite this sadness, the Bible does not even suggest there was anything other than love and respect between Sarah and Abraham. In the midst of the daily routine of living, they had built a life together. One assumes that, over the course of their years together, they had found a way to put aside their sorrow and disappointment and go on with life.

Suddenly, a door that had been closed for so long was again flung open. However, at this point in her life, *in old age*(!), how else could Sarah possibly respond *except* with surprised laughter at such an absurdity. In that moment, there was no room for belief *or disbelief*, only surprise and amazement. (continued on page 2-Medicine)

And so, Sarah laughed, astonished yet <u>not</u> distrusting of God's announcement concerning her.

Rev. Edgerton saw in this story a way to talk about how we people of faith are still being called out to a life and a ministry that is just as surprising—and in some ways, absurd—as the announcement that Sarah received. We, too, are being called out into a future with God, to a ministry that can and will change the world for good. Us—Nu'uanu Congregational Church—God is calling us into ministry and mission.

Rev. Edgerton imagines that most of us will wonder at God's choice to use <u>us</u>, and advises us to do what Sarah did. Go ahead and laugh, he says, "It makes room inside us for God to work miracles."

I agree: laugh. Laugh because it brings fresh air into the lungs and then releases it back to warm the world. Laugh because there is always time enough for sorrow. Laugh because laughter can clear away the cobwebs, refresh the mind, and help make us to ready to begin a new adventure. Laugh because it is, indeed, good medicine.

As you know, I will be taking some time off for hip replacement surgery. I look forward to returning on September 19. I look forward to many years with all of you, years filled with ministry and laughter together.

Church World Service and the earthquake in Hatti

CWS is conducting damage assessments with partners. This process will likely take several days, given communications limitations and the magnitude of the quake. Our team will also conduct an assessment of the houses and schools that have been constructed through CWS programs in recent years to determine whether there are new needs among those program participants.

We anticipate that our response will focus on recovery and rehabilitation. We know that will include housing reconstruction, trauma recovery support and water infrastructure repairs in the municipality of Pestel, a community that our team worked with to recover following Hurricane Matthew.

Church World Service assisting Afghan refugees

Church World Service have been assisting individuals who served alongside the U.S. mission in Afghanistan and urges the Biden administration and Congress to prioritize the evacuation of all of the more than 18,000. The organization, along with other U.S. partner agencies, will provide services for arrivals through case management and resettlement services.

"These men and women put themselves at risk to support the U.S. mission in Afghanistan. They were interpreters, they were cooks, they were office workers. They took on a great number of roles to keep Americans safe and defend their nation. With the withdrawal of U.S. forces, however, they are increasingly vulnerable for that service," said Erol Kekic, Senior Vice President for the Immigration and Refugee Program at Church World Service. "That's why we are involved from the moment they set foot on American soil, so they can focus on family and the future, not the fear they've been living in for far too long."

Church World Service welcomes refugees across 17 states through 23 offices. They provide services to newly arrived refugees and immigrants, helping them to integrate into local communities, find jobs and learn the necessary skills to support their new lives in the United States.


