



Three Crosses

Every year at this time, my mind and my computer screen tend to fill up with hymns and artwork portraying the sights and sounds of Holy Week as I plan the services for which we will gather. One of the reoccurring images is that of the three crosses.

All of us are familiar with the one cross on which Christ died. I find myself wondering how often we remember the other two crosses. They are

mentioned in all four of the Gospels. Jesus was crucified with two bandits, one on either side of him.

In Matthew and Luke's recounting of the crucifixion, the bandits speak to Jesus, although Luke is the only one who tells us what they said. One taunts him like the others—the Roman soldiers and the priests, scribes, and elders. The other, however, recognizes Jesus for who he is and asks that Jesus remember him when he enters his kingdom.

The thing that always amazes me about the story of Christ is his humanity. He never stops being fully human even while he is fully divine. He was born of Mary, which is to say, he came into the world the way all infants do. He walked the dusty roads of Palestine. Joined with all sorts of people in all sorts of places, often sharing a meal with them. He also got tired and withdrew to quiet places to rest and pray—at least he tried to. It seems the crowds always managed to find him. All of these stories depict very human needs and responses.

One of my favorite stories (I have a lot of them) is the one when he and the disciples are crossing the Sea of Galilee and a storm comes up nearly swamping the boat. The disciples are terrified. However, when they look for Jesus, they find he has fallen asleep...on a cushion. I am always glad when I read Luke's telling of this story. I like that he got some sleep <u>and</u> that he got what sounds like the only cushion on the boat!

One of the last and most moving stories of Jesus is, of course, the story of Jesus' last meal with the disciples. He gathers them in the upper room. There may have been other foods they shared that evening—fish, cheese, perhaps fruit—but the only food that is specifically mentioned is bread and wine. These are the two things all people—the great and the humble—would have had.

Sanctuary Repairs Starting on April 19, 2022

The Sanctuary Repairs are finally starting. After many rounds with Terminix's insurance company and their Authorized Contractor, Makainai Construction, the repairs to the sanctuary are finally starting. After going through the long process, the building permit was issued in early February 2022. With in-person worship starting on March 6, 2022, Makainai Construction decided to hold off starting work until after Easter.

The work will start on April 19, 2022 and will continue until the end of May 2022, pending any unforeseen conditions and inclement weather. The scope of work is replacing the termite eaten fascia, T&G decking, and painting. For safety reasons, the Sanctuary will not be accessible during the repair work.

In that last supper, Jesus raised these humble, common things and made them sacred. The most ordinary of things became a window through which we are able to see him and experience his presence. Through the act of taking nourishment, we and are drawn close to Christ. Indeed, our bodies become one with his.

Finally, in the last moments of his earthly life, he is not spirited away from or out of his humanity. Instead, he draws his last breath beside two other human beings. He suffers the same way they do. He hears the cynicism and scorn of the one, and he witnesses the hope and the faith of the other. He even comes to know their feelings of loss and sorrow, the spiritual anguish that is also a part of human life. All of who we are is also all of who Jesus was, and is, too. There is not one emotion we have that he did not also experience.

During Lent, and especially during Holy Week, April 10 through April 17, we will listen again to the stories of blessing and sacredness that was Jesus' human life. We will marvel at the generosity of Christ. We will bear witness to the love of God that would not allow the tomb to have the last word about Jesus' life...nor ours, but brought Jesus back out into the blessed light of a new day so that we—all human beings—may also be guided to the way to new life, and life everlasting.

I look forward to celebrating Christ's resurrection with you. Happy Easter!




Easter Lily Sale

Mask Mandate
