

A Family Christ Has Made

Throughout the Lenten season, a group of us read a book called *Witness at the Cross* written by Prof. Amy Jill Levine the Rabbi Stanley M. Kessler Distinguished Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Hartford Seminary.

Some of us met in-person over tea on Wednesday mornings. While the evening group met via Zoom. It was interesting how each group had distinctly different responses and questions. Mostly, we were amazed by how much more

there was to "see" and learn as we reflected on the different people who were present at the crucifixion.

I do not believe it is an exaggeration to say that *most* of us do not notice the different people Jesus encounters that day as he makes his way to Golgotha. Most of us focus on him; his pain, and how cruelly the Savior of the world was treated by the very people he had come to save.

By focusing her book on the bystanders, Prof. Levine helps us see what the human response was on that day—the good and the bad. Rather than encountering them as two-dimensional characters who have little or no meaning we are asked to consider them as real people with real fears and expectations... just like us.

With the eye of a historian, Prof. Levine describes what it was like to be a centurion or an important Pharisee who comes to faith. She helps us have a much fuller understanding of the two criminals who were crucified on each side of Jesus. She uses scenes from her own life and popular culture to ask herself, and the reader, what Jesus' crucifixion means to us in our day and age.

The effect on the reader, as we consider the human characters Jesus saw and interacted with as he was crucified, is that we begin to "see" the crucifixion with greater clarity. That is, rather than the spectacle of the crucifixion, the reader begins to focus on what Jesus' suffering has meant <u>beyond</u> the crucifixion as an event.

What was especially poignant for some of us was the depiction of Jesus in the Gospel of John when Jesus—from the cross—entrusts to the Beloved Disciple, the care of his mother—he made them into a family. From the very depths of his suffering, Jesus' attention was <u>out</u>ward focused, focused on the care and well-being of others.

He was focused on helping his disciples to see what the love he has for us can mean in our lives and our love toward others, even without his physical presence. For love of him, we can move closer to one another in new relationships of love and support. In his name, we can come to see one another as a family that Christ has made—not only here among our NCC church family, but far beyond, even into the world.
