# For All the Saints By Pastor Jeannie Thompson

For all the saints who from their labors rest, who to the world their steadfast faith confessed, your name, O Jesus, be forever blessed.

Alleluia! Alleluia!

The New Century Hymnal, No. 299

At this time of year, I am reminded of the lines quoted above. I am reminded of the saints of the church who lived and served in the past history of this church, and <u>you</u>, the ones I have the honor and pleasure of serving now. This is especially true right now as I reflect on what you, the saints of Nu'uanu Congregational Church, have accomplished in our Capital Campaign.

Perhaps the lines from the hymn, *For All the Saints* (printed above), will have even greater meaning for you now. Most of us who have been members of the church for just about any length of time will recognize them. I believe that this is not only true for our church but for many churches in the west because, as I found out, *For All the Saints* has been included in just about every English language hymnal since it first came out in 1864. (I know this for certain because I tried to count the number of hymnals it is in. I lost count at about number eighty...and there was still a substantial list left to count!) As for us: we sing it at least once every year on All Saints Day, but also on other occasions, too.

This well-beloved hymn was written by Fr. William W. How who served as priest and Bishop in the Anglican church in England. In his lifetime, Fr. How wrote over sixty hymns and a great many songs for children. Because of his great love for children, he was often called "the children's pastor." He was also known for his work with the poor and with industrial workers in Wales.

You may be interested (and relieved to know) that although Fr. How wrote <u>eleven</u> stanzas for this hymn, our hymnal only includes five, and we usually only sing three.

For those of us who have not sung (or read) all eleven verses of the original hymn, this is what *Hymnary.org*, a website that publishes the history of almost every hymn ever written, says about the hymn:

There is considerable variance between hymnals as to which of the eleven original stanzas are included (typically six to eight are selected)...

There are also differences in wording between different hymnals. Some merely modernize the language (i.e., "Thou wast their rock" becomes "You were their rock"). Other changes, as well as the choice of which stanzas to include, appear to reflect a desire to slightly soften the theme of the Church militant, which is heavily present in the text. Our hymnal, thank goodness, does "soften" the language. However, knowing the conditions of the people Bishop How lived among, and his deep dedication to the poor (especially in Wales), I cannot help but believe that the language he used was also directed toward the real and important struggle he and others pursued on behalf of the poor and destitute; and for justice and compassion for those in need. Perhaps he was "militant" in that regard and expected the Church to also be likewise committed.

What I am certain of is that the same Spirit of compassion, and the desire that the Christian message that the good news of Christ shall be for all people is the same message, the same ideal, that has been real and strong in our church for close to one hundred and forty years. What is more, we proved to ourselves that our desire to carry the message of Christ on into the future was just made joyfully obvious in the outpouring of support we have given to the Capital Campaign we brought to a close this past Sunday, September 24th. Indeed, our support of the Capital Campaign that is going to repair and refresh our Sanctuary is something we are doing for more than ourselves.

We are doing this so that we may fully and abundantly welcome the wider community in many more ways. We are dedicated to making our Sanctuary a place to gather and support community initiatives and programs—things that make for community healing and thriving. In short, we are forging a path into the future with God as our foundation, Christ as our inspiration, and the Holy Spirit as our guide.

# Recycling


